RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS . . . Lent: The Season of Reconciliation

The Church's season of Lent begins this year on March 1st (Ash Wednesday). Lent is often seen as a dreary time for Christians. The colors used in worship are more muted, the shiny brass and silver appointments used in the liturgy are put away or covered up, and the prayers and the music often sound more somber. Add to that the clergy urging parishioners to give up something they enjoy (chocolate is a perennial favorite of many) or to spend more time in prayer, Bible reading, or other spiritual practices.

Putting all these things aside, however, what truly makes Lent perhaps the most profound season of the Christian year is that it places before us God's love for humanity in the timeless call to reconciliation.

Reconciliation of the individual and the world to God is at the heart of our hope as Christians, for we believe that God, through Christ, has opened the way for all of humanity to be united in mutual concern and respect. This reconciliation, or the restoration of God's intentions for humanity, must move individual believers to return to God whether this is mediated by the Church or through personal repentance and/or conversion. That is the starting point of reconciliation, for it is not for the individual alone but for the greater purposes of God. (The resurrection of Jesus from the dead was not for the sole glorification of Christ. Rather, it was so that resurrection life might come to all peoples through the flesh of the One who was crucified and raised.)

Just as with Christ, the reconciliation/restoration of an individual does not occur within an isolated state where it will do no greater good, but is to become an efficacious channel for greater and greater conversion. If this restoration with God is to mean anything holy and enduring, we must strive to bring Christ into our closest relationships – starting with family and friends, and then moving out from there to our communities, our nation, and to the greater concerns of the world.

Every year God and the Church offer us this opportunity during the season of Lent to renew our focus on reconciliation. It is once more upon us. May we use it well.

Search Yields 50-plus Applicants for Next Bishop

Process will go quiet until May

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The Search Committee for the 11th Bishop of Delaware is now at the heart of its work: reviewing the applications of the 50+ candidates for our next bishop. We thank you all for your input, suggestions and engagement through the surveys, Town Halls, and development of our diocesan profile.

Critical to the integrity of the process is confidentiality. The Search Committee is dedicated to a process that: secures the confidentiality of the applicants; is respectful and pastoral in our interactions with each of them; and is one in which we hold each other on the Committee in prayer, have open and respectful conversations and exploration, and trust in the work of the Holy Spirit. Our target date is to produce a slate of three to five nominees to the Standing Committee of the Diocese in early May. You won't be hearing much from us between now and then.

We ask you to pray for us during this time of discernment. We ask you to pray for the candidates, who have already invested their time, soul work and emotional energy into this process. If you are a deputy to the electing convention in July, we ask that you familiarize yourself fully with the profile, especially "who we seek." We ask you to pray for our Diocese, as we look forward to this next chapter of our common life together as People of the Way.

Confirmation and New Member Classes to be offered in the seasons of Lent and Easter

Confirmation is a sacrament of the church that is offered to support a maturing Christian faith and life. While there is no minimum age, those studying to be confirmed should possess the capacity to enter into a period of learning and reflection about God, the Bible, the faith of the Church, and Christian history including the origins of the Episcopal Church and its traditions. This study would also be informative to those who have begun to attend worship in the Episcopal Church and those who might want to officially join the church.

*Eight classes are scheduled to be held on Wednesday evenings (the schedule is being worked out), with assignments to be completed at home between classes. **The initial class meeting will be held on Wednesday, March 15th.***

The study period will go through May, and culminate in the rite of Confirmation (or Reception) at a **Regional Service to be held at 4:00pm at Christ Church, Greenville, on Pentecost Sunday on June 4, 2017.** Bishop Bud Shand, retired bishop of the Diocese of Easton, will be present for the Regional Service.

Fr. Jim heading to Nicaragua with *Food for the Poor*

In 2015 and 2016 at Fr. Jim's invitation, retired Episcopal priests have addressed the congregation about the international relief organization **Food for the Poor** (FFP). A Christian charity based in Coconut Creek, Florida, FFP feeds hundreds of thousands of people every day in 17 countries throughout the Caribbean and Latin America. When Fr. Bob Deshaies visited St. James' last fall he stayed overnight with the Bimbi's in their home, and during his visit Fr. Deshaies urged Fr. Jim to make a trip to get a firsthand look at the types of missions FFP supports from the donations they receive. FFP not only provides food, but supports projects to build modest housing, provide clean water and medicines, supply schools, and develop sustainable agriculture.

Applying late last year, Fr. Jim was selected to travel to Nicaragua with a group of clergy from around the country. He leaves Monday, March 6th, and returns on Friday, March 10th. He is excited for this opportunity, and after he gets back will share what he learned and experienced.



Lent Madness 2017

Which saint will win the Golden Halo?

For the eighth year running, people worldwide are gearing up for Lent Madness, the “saintly smack down” in which thirty-two saints do battle to win the coveted Golden Halo.

The creator of Lent Madness, the Rev. Tim Schenck, says, “The saints aren’t just remote images in stained glass windows or pious-looking statues. They were real people God just happened to use in marvelous ways.” Lent Madness began on Schenck’s blog in 2010 as he sought a way to combine his love of sports with his passion for the lives of saints.

The Rev. Canon Scott Gunn, Schenck’s Lent Madness co-conspirator, says, “Throughout Lent, as we’re having fun with the competition, we are also inspired by how God used ordinary people to do extraordinary things.” Gunn, who is executive director of Forward Movement in Cincinnati, Ohio, adds, “That’s the whole point of the Christian life: to allow God to work in us to share God’s love and proclaim Good News.”

Here’s how it works: 32 saints are placed into a tournament-like single elimination bracket. On the weekdays of Lent, information is posted at www.lentmadness.org about two different saints. Each pairing remains open for a set period of time as participants read about and then vote for their favorite saint. Sixteen saints make it to the Round of the “*Saintly Sixteen*”; eight advance to the Round of the “*Elate Eight*”; four make it to the “*Faithful Four*”; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the coveted **Golden Halo**. The first round consists of basic biographical information about each of the 32 saints. Things get a bit more interesting in the subsequent rounds as we offer quotes and quirks, explore legends, and even move into the area of saintly kitsch.



This is a fun way to learn about some of the saints of the Christian faith as we journey through Lent towards Easter – The Day of the Resurrection!

April 14th – Good Friday – 9:30am Good Friday Liturgy. Ecumenical service at 12 noon with the Churches of the Mill Creek Ministerium with preaching on the Seven Last Words of Jesus from the Cross.

April 15th – Holy Saturday – 9:00am Liturgy for Holy Saturday, and Neighborhood Easter Egg Hunt at 11:00am.

April 16th – Easter Sunday – Joyful services of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ at 8:00am & 10:15am.

April 30th – The 3rd Sunday of Easter – ONE SERVICE @ 9:00am, followed by brunch and the Annual Parish Meeting.
