# Rector's Ramblings . . . Speed up? Slow Down? Or just pull over?

Last week while driving on Interstate 95, I witnessed an interesting thing. It was a car going 55 miles-per-hour in a 55 MPH speed limit zone! I know – Crazy, right?

I was in the middle lane heading south from the Philadelphia Airport. Keeping up with the flow of traffic, I was unmindful of the speed we were all traveling until approaching a car on my right hand side. As the whole center lane of cars and trucks went streaming past this vehicle I wondered what could the driver be thinking? Doesn't this person know how dangerous it is to him/herself and to others to be going so slow on a major highway?

Glancing at my speedometer, I saw that I was going 65. The realization struck me that the driver was probably thinking that staying within the posted speed limit was the right thing to do. Me, on the other hand? I'm just mindlessly going along with the pace of the crowd.

How often we allow ourselves to be influenced by others without so much as a thought to the potential consequences to our own life. Looking back on my younger days, I can recall some awfully stupid things I did or exposed myself to in those moments I acquiesced to the circumstances or the people around me. Did I know better? Not always. Maturity does come from accumulated life experience. But during those times when I knew that what I was doing was wrong, or at least ill advised, why did I not stop myself?

Now before you call or drop me a note with your explanation of my actions (or inactions), let me just say that I'm not asking for you to explain me to me. I'm working on that myself, thank you very much. And if you should tell me that you've found yourself in situations similar to what I've described, I promise to refrain from diagnosing your problem and prescribing the ultimate cure. What I offer, however, are a few observations from my own reflections:

- Keeping ourselves within proper limits is probably a good thing in the long run.
- Always rushing to the next "must-do" item does not make us better persons.
- Allowing others to pass ahead of us does not detract from our self-worth as individuals.
- Slowing down can conserve energy we'll need later.
- We should occasionally stop to see if where we're headed is where we want to end up.

Our faith informs us that sabbath rest is an important component to keeping our lives in balance with God and one another. Summertime is a good time to remind myself, and all of you, to slow down and reconnect with the Lord of Life.


# **Bishop Announces plans for retirement**

In a letter dated April 27, 2016, The Rt. Rev. Wayne P. Wright, announced his plans to retire as the Bishop of Delaware in 2017. The following is his letter in its entirety:

Dear Friends:

In June I will be begin my nineteenth year as your bishop. From the day Holly, Parker, and I arrived in Delaware we have been blessed. Seeing so many good

things happen is a source of great satisfaction to me. Today all of our congregations are served by a remarkable and faithful group of clergy. Our Episcopal schools, Memorial House, Camp Arrowhead and our many other ministries are also doing well. Our diocese rests on a sound financial and administrative foundation. There is a genuine



sense of unity among the lay leaders, clergy, and staff who do so much to support and guide our diocese.

With so many things going well I believe that this is the right time for me to move toward retirement and for the diocese to begin planning the election of your next bishop. Responsibility for overseeing the election of a new bishop rests with the diocesan Standing Committee. I met with the Standing Committee last week to share my decision. In mid-May the Standing Committee will meet with Bishop Clay Matthews. He has the specific responsibility for advising dioceses during a transition. Together they will begin laying out the steps and a specific timeline for nominating and electing a new bishop. I have great confidence in their ability to lead this process.

We are at the beginning of a transition that will take some time to unfold. I plan to continue in office until early next year. Before I leave there will be opportunities to celebrate all that we have accomplished and time to say goodbye. I love being your bishop and it is an honor to serve with you. I will always be grateful for the friends we have made, the challenges God has offered us, and the accomplishments we have shared. These have been the best years of my ministry.

As always, I ask for your prayers just as you will be in mine.

#### How does a Diocese receive a new Bishop?

With Bishop Wright's announced plans to retire, the question has been asked as to how the diocese will receive a new bishop. The responsibility falls to the Standing Committee of the Diocese which consists of four lay persons and four clergy, all of whom were elected by the delegates from each congregation at the annual diocesan convention. (In case you were unaware, Bruce Vrana, a member of St. James' Church, is one of the elected lay members.) The President of the Standing Committee, The Rev. Patricia S. Downing, has to date issued two letters to the diocese, and for your information are reprinted on the following pages.

#### May 11th Letter from the President of the Standing Committee

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Bishop Wright sent a letter to the diocese on April 27<sup>th</sup> letting us know that he plans to retire in early 2017. Bishop Wright has served faithfully as our bishop for the past 19 years. His prayerful leadership has seen us through good times and difficult decisions. His prudent oversight of the diocesan finances helped us weather the recession. I am personally grateful for his attention to the health and wellbeing of the clergy and lay leaders of the diocese. He leaves a diocese that is strong, vibrant and ready to meet the challenges and opportunities to come.

As President of the Standing Committee, I want you to know what happens next. When a bishop retires, the diocese enters a search for a new one. That search is similar to one that a parish goes through. A search committee will be appointed by the Standing Committee. They will be representative of the diversity of this diocese. Once appointed, they will work with a consultant to draft a profile of the diocese that highlights who we are and what we seek in our next bishop. The process for crafting this profile will most likely involve meetings throughout the diocese as well as surveys to receive input from as wide a group as we can gather. The search committee will then solicit applications, interview prospective clergy and choose a slate of candidates which the Standing Committee presents to the diocese for election. A special convention of the diocese will be held to elect the next bishop.

The time line for all of this is still to be determined. The Standing Committee of the diocese is meeting on May 17<sup>th</sup> with Bishop Clay Matthews who is in charge of bishop elections for the Episcopal Church. He will recommend a process and time line for us. Once we have that information we will pass that along to you. If you have thoughts or ideas of folk who would be good candidates for the Search or Transition Committees please feel free to send them to me. These names should be submitted by May 16<sup>th</sup>.

I ask you also to pray for the Standing Committee, this diocese, for the committees charged with this important work and for those who will be discerning a call to this new ministry.

## May 18<sup>th</sup> Letter from the Standing Committee

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The Standing Committee intends to keep the diocese informed about the process to elect our next bishop. We plan on having a dedicated web site where all of the information, calendar, forms and anything else we craft will reside. That is in process. Until that is up and running we will continue to use The Net and other means to communicate.

Yesterday, the Bishop and the Standing Committee met with the Right Reverend Clay Matthews, the bishop in charge of episcopal elections. Bishop Matthews walked us through the best practices that are suggested for a diocese as they enter into a search. The most basic tasks are to create a timeline, ask members of the diocese to serve on the Search and Transition Committees and engage a consultant to help us with this process. We are currently working on all three. Thank you to everyone who submitted names for consideration. From your suggestions, we have come up with a list of individuals that we feel represent the diversity, in all its forms, of the diocese. Those individuals will be asked over the course of the next few days to serve. Once the committees are formed, we will let you know their contact information.

The work of the Search Committee is to:

- A. Develop and oversee a process for creating a Diocesan profile;
- B. Receive nominations;
- C. Review the qualifications of those being considered;
- D. Conduct interviews and a retreat as a means of getting to know the potential candidates;
- E. Prayerfully select and present to the Standing Committee a slate of nominees (number to be determined) who have consented to stand for election and whose background checks have been approved.

The work of the Transition Committee is to:

- A. Publish complete profiles of the candidates and any other educational material deemed helpful;
- B. Provide for the "walkabout" opportunities for all nominees to meet with as many members of the Diocese as possible;
- C. Provide hospitality for the candidates and their families;
- D. Help in the planning for the ordination and consecration of the new Bishop;
- E. Assist the Bishop in adapting to and being introduced to the Diocesan Community;
- F. Provide for the transition of Bishop Wright from office.

We are delighted that the Presiding Bishop, the Most Rev. Michael Curry, is planning to be with the Diocese of Delaware on December 9, 2017 for the ordination and consecration of our next bishop. We have begun to plan out the course of the process. Here is the timeline we developed yesterday:

May 2016 - Search and Transition Committees are formed and a consultant is chosen

<u>July 2016</u> – A retreat with the consultant for the Standing Committee, the Search Committee and the Transition Committee is held Search committee begins its work reviewing previous profiles, crafting surveys and designing ways to engage the members of the diocese

August 2016 - Surveys are conducted

<u>September 2016</u> - Diocesan conversations regarding drafts of the profile

Early-Fall 2016 - The profile is published and potential candidates' names submitted

<u>Mid-Fall 2016</u> – Goodbye parties begin for Bishop Wright and Holly

January 27-28, 2017 - Diocesan Convention

<u>Early-Winter 2017</u> – Bishop Wright's last day

Winter 2017 - Screening of candidates

March 2017 - Retreat for the candidates

Spring 2017 - Slate of candidates is announced

Summer 2017 - "Walkabouts" (times to meet the candidates) and electing convention

December 9, 2017 - ordination and consecration

This timeline enables us to do the work we, as a diocese, need to do to prepare for the election, ordination and consecration of the XI Bishop of Delaware. The diocese is healthy, stable and prepared to move forward with good momentum. We are in a good place and poised for an intentional and prayerful transition.

This is an exciting time. It is for celebration, reflection, dreaming and rejoicing. We hope that you will join us in this holy work as we thank and say goodbye to Bishop Wright and Holly, and then turn toward the future and embrace its opportunities and challenges. Thank you for your prayers and for your willingness to engage this process with faithfulness.








#### What you need:
