Rector's Ramblings: It's Not what we Say, it's what we Do

During the Sundays in Lent the Sunday morning Adult Class has focused on Jesus' exhortations that his followers care for the "least of these my brothers and sisters" (Matthew 25:40). By the least of these Jesus didn't mean those that were of less importance or earthly status. Jesus never used the yardsticks that societies and cultures employ to draw distinctions between people. Quite the opposite, he seems to cross every boundary, ignore any division that is put in the way to anything less than full recognition of the sacredness of each and every person. For Christians, as followers of Jesus Christ, doing likewise is not an optional aspect of our faith. It is a central tenet of what we should be proclaiming to a world that often denies the image of God in which we were all created.

But saying that we believe this and actually acting with respect and concern for others are two entirely different matters. Words must carry meaning; otherwise they are empty to the point of being hurtful by their pointlessness. When we say we care about the hungry, then we must find ways help, either through direct donations of food or by sending money to an organization that provides assistance. If we say that homelessness is an affront, not against the peace of a community but against the dignity of individuals, then we better find a way to literally get people in out of the cold.

It is with these thoughts in mind that I pass along the following antidote. The monetary offering taken at the main worship service of the recent convention of the Diocese of Delaware was designated to go to ministries working with homeless persons. The decision as to which ministries would receive a share of the offering was left up to our bishop, The Rt. Rev. Wayne P. Wright. Bishop Wright is well aware of the commitment of Family Promise to assist families that are homeless. So, it was a welcome surprise that he sent me a check for \$250 with the request that I pass it along to the Executive Director of Family Promise with his thanks and respect for all that they do to work with homeless families in northern Delaware. He also expressed his gratitude for the support that the people of St. James' Mill Creek have given to this ministry.

It was a kind gesture on the part of our Bishop. Now, as we approach the great Feast of the Resurrection, it is time for us to rededicate ourselves to offering new life, new hope, to those who are in any need or trouble. It is what Christ calls us to do. The Rev. Jim Bimbi

Ecumenical worship services are held at 12:30pm followed by a simple lunch. St. James' day to provide worship, soup and

bread is March 9th. This year's theme is: "Conversion: Becoming Disciples of Christ"

March 20th – Palm/Passion Sunday 2016

Last year the Worship Life Ministry Team planned two different services on what is commonly referred to as Palm Sunday, which is the Sunday before Easter Day. We will once again be offering these two very meaningful, but somewhat different services again this year. Below are the explanations and thoughts behind these services.



In the Episcopal tradition, the Sunday before Easter is called "The Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday". The service on that day begins with a reading recalling the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem when the people spread palm branches on the ground in front of him. This joyful entry is recalled in the first part of the liturgy as palms are blessed and distributed to every member of the congregation, and as we recall the words of the people of Jerusalem: "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the LORD. Hosanna in the highest."

The "Palm Sunday" celebration, however, doesn't last very long. With little opportunity given to reflect upon Jesus' arrival at Jerusalem and the days he spent in and around the Temple, the mood of the service turns somber in the reading of the Passion Narrative with its focus on the Last Supper and then Jesus' arrest, trial, and crucifixion. Since the Church also observes these events later in the week, the inclusion of the Passion Narrative on Palm Sunday can diminish the worship impact for those who attend services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

With these thoughts in mind, the Palm Sunday services on March 20th will be as follows:

- <u>8:00am Service</u> This service will include the complete traditional liturgy of the Book of Common Prayer including the Gospel reading on the Triumphal Entry and the blessing of palms at the start of the service, the reading of the Passion Narrative from the Gospel according to Luke (with parts assigned to the congregation), and concluding with the Holy Eucharist.
- <u>10:15am Service</u> Worship will begin much like a regular Sunday. The Gospel reading on the Triumphal Entry will be moved to the normal position of the Gospel, followed immediately by the blessing and distribution of palms, the singing of "All Glory Laud and Honor", and then a sermon on the meaning of the Triumphal Entry, Jesus' last days in Jerusalem, and Jesus' ultimate destiny of the cross. The service will conclude with the Holy Eucharist.

Neighborhood Easter Egg Hunt and Hot Dog Lunch

Every year we invite the neighborhood children to join our own youth for our annual Easter Egg Hunt. Everyone is asked to congregate in the parking lot at 11AM on Saturday March 26th. Following the hunt, the hunters and their families are invited to a free hot dog lunch. It's a great way to meet our neighbors and introduce them to our parish.

Please consider donating food and helping with the lunch. Sign-up sheets are posted in the foyer of the parish house.



We also need individually wrapped candies and plastic eggs for the hunt. The youth group will stuff them and hide them but we need you to supply the goods. Please bring donations to the office or drop them off at church any time between now and Palm Sunday, March 20^{th} .

Are we having a Flea Market on April 16th? Help us Decide!

Nancy and Scott Martter have helped organize the last two flea markets but are presently in the middle of plans to purchase a new home. So, they rightfully cannot commit to head up this year's sale at this time. Please consider helping out with this annual fundraiser. VESTRY MEETING – FEBRUARY 8, 2016 – SUMMARY OF BUSINESS

(A complete copy of the Feb 2016 Minutes is available from the Parish Office upon request)

FINANCIAL MATTERS:

- The deficit for 2015 was \$12,900. It was a little more than the projected amount of \$11,800.
- Pledges and contributions were \$14,000 below the budgeted amount.
- St. James was named as a beneficiary on an insurance policy taken out by Rue Ann Dubel. The parish will receive \$3,663/yr. for two years and probably a third year.
- A letter to the Parish from the Vestry was included in the February newsletter. It included steps taken by the Vestry to manage the shortfall in the 2016 budget:
 - The cost of living increase on salaries recommended by the diocese, will not be implemented.
 - The congregational assessment paid to the diocese will be lowered by \$1,000.
 - The Vestry is looking to reduce the music and various other parish program expenditures.

PROPERTY:

- **Phone System:** The current phone system is obsolete and can no longer be serviced. Dick Prettyman researched several possible replacement systems and presented his findings to the Vestry. It was decided that a proposal from AVATEL was considered the best for St. James. It included a 5 year lease on new equipment, installation, programming, training, maintenance coverage, fax capability with splitters. The cost will be \$79.69/mo.
- **Fire Sprinkler Inspections:** Wayman Fire Protection, Inc. submitted a bid for a contract renewal. It is a five year contract @ \$300/yr. The system extension to the Rectory would be an add-on to the contract at an additional \$300/yr. Vestry approved both contracts, with the cost of inspection in the Rectory passed along to Family Promise.
- **Fire Sprinkler Code Violation:** The sprinklers in the Bazaar Room are in violation of code as they are concealed by the ceiling tiles. The estimated cost of repairs is \$4,304. Vestry authorized repairs, not to exceed \$5,000.
- **Family Promise Covenant:** The Family Promise board has proposed a 5-Year Agreement, Feb. 1, 2016 Jan. 31, 2021, with monthly payments to St. James' increased annual by \$30/month. Vestry authorized moving forward with the new covenant.
- **Removal of Abandoned Oil Tank:** DNREC paid to have the oil tank removed. The subsequent soil evaluation report indicated that there won't be any problem with soil contamination as long as the site is left undisturbed. Replacing the sidewalk will not disturb the site.
- **Office Computers:** The Vista operating system currently running our computers is obsolete and will no longer be supported or updated by major internet providers. Windows 10 may have to be purchased.

UPDATE from THE JOURNEY TEAM:

- The Team has been meeting bi-weekly.and continues to analyze the information received from the parishioners.
- They have identified common themes of Outreach Internal & External, Relationship Building, Growth & Decline, Spirituality & Worship, and Financial. The team has decided that the financial piece is not a part of their agenda and needs to be given to the Financial Advisory Committee.
- They have come to the realization that the process is going to take more time than they thought.
- The team will begin looking at committee structure next.

PARISH COMMUNICATON:

- The Newsletter will now be attached electronically to the e-Epistle and posted on the Website.
- Printed copies of the newsletter will be available in the Church and Parish House.
- It was proposed that a survey be conducted to find out who needs it mailed.
