Rector's Ramblings . . . Thanksgiving: A Day or a Daily Practice?

The month of November brings with it the national holiday of Thanksgiving Day. It has its origins in the harvest festival first observed by the Pilgrims in October 1621, and in a proclamation signed by President George Washington in 1789 that "Thursday the 26th of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be."

After 1789, an annual day of Thanksgiving was observed off and on through the years until 1863, when President Abraham Lincoln established it as a federal holiday to be held on the last Thursday of November. In some years November has five Thursdays instead of four, and so it happened that in 1939, when there were five, President Franklin D. Roosevelt decided to break with tradition and declared that Thanksgiving that year would to be celebrated on the fourth Thursday. Twenty-three states went along with Roosevelt, and twenty-two did not, resulting in some people referring to a "Democratic Thanksgiving" (for those who followed to Roosevelt's declaration) and a "Republican Thanksgiving" (those who held to the tradition established by Lincoln). This state of affairs continued until 1942 when the U. S. Congress passed legislation affixing the holiday on the fourth Thursday in all states of the Union.

All of which points out that while it is a good thing for the people of our nation to collectively offer a day of thanksgiving, how much more important it is to seek and give thanks on a daily basis. For Christians our thanks are directed towards God our creator, Jesus Christ our redeemer, and the Holy Spirit our guide. May we remind ourselves of this with all our words and actions.

To Advent 2018

The Start of a New Church Year – The First Sunday of Advent, which this year falls on December 2nd, marks the beginning of a new Church Year. Advent, from the Latin word *adventus*, means 'coming' or 'emergence' and is the season during which Christians prepare for the coming of Christ, most notably observed with the celebration of the birth of Jesus. Since Jesus has already been born, however, it also carries the call to prepare for when the Risen Christ will come again in power and great glory.
